Dear Professor Blackman

These results are based on 30 evaluations returned, yielding a response rate of 68.18%.

The indicators shown at the top of the report represent the average of each group of questions, with Cronbach's Alpha describing the internal consistency of a question group.



- I went into this class dreading it because of what I have heard about Prof. Blackman and what I had seen online. I actually like him and respect him more than I thought I would. My one and only drawback has been class discussion. I do believe class discussion is important in con law but there did seem to be one political opinion that was expressed more often and given more weight. Prof. Blackman does a good job at giving both sides most of the time and even correcting students who attempted to mock or discredit the previous administration but I did often wonder if I was learning the constitution based on republican point of views and not a neutral learning. I will never know. There were times that the floor was opened to opinions but I personally never felt comfortable giving mine because some opinions received more pushback than others, and the opinions that received more pushback were often more liberal ways of thinking. Other than the discussion of sensitive topics, I enjoyed this class and it was easily my favorite subject to learn about this semester. I appreciate Prof. Blackman and the steps he took to make this class unbiased. I am not sure there is a way to teach this class from a neutral political view point but I do believe he tried his best.

- I think there's a handful of statements the professor made, during due process clause cases, that would better be classified as opinion, not fact, but were stated as if they were fact. Not inaccuracies about the cases but the (historical vs contemporary) social science behind some decisions.

It seemed like most of our section had not spend much time, in undergrad or otherwise, wrestling with these types of questions so the class discussion tended to simply follow the professor's logic and not prompt much in the way of counter arguments. Think he could've done slightly better facilitating that.

- Okay so I gave Professor Blackman everything that he deserves in the classroom, he really is a wonderful classroom professor and he truly knows the material. My issue with him present in his social stances, professor Blackman often says things like "I don't even understand what a tort is" to me this phrase says everything you need to know about him. He is a man who clearly doesn't understand how his actions impact the world around him and how they negatively affect millions of people. This is the most disappointing part about the class, he's completely tone deaf He teaches about freedom and about people who took their freedom yet he supports people who are actively against human freedom. Overall, I would say that he is a great in classroom professor, but personally, I find him to be a scumbag.
- Professor Blackman definitely knows his stuff. He is incredibly well educated on the subject matter. However, Professor Blackman talked down to some students and would often invoke a negative tone to student's answers or questions. I was very excited to take Constitutional Law this semester because I have always had a passion for history and the Constitution, but I end this class very disappointed. I would read the material and watch the videos Professor Blackman instructed us to watch to prepare for class and would feel adequately prepared for class, but still feel lost in his lectures. In the beginning of the semester I would raise my hand and ask questions because I was so interested in the subject matter, but I began to do this less and less as the semester progressed due to Professor Blackman's responses to my questions. It would always feel like he was not actually listening to my question and give me abruptly short answers because I was "unworthy" in his eyes. While he would openly praise other students in my class for asking the "right" questions, I completely stopped engaging with class because how he would answer me. A similar pattern followed for recitation as well. He would ask me complex questions about a case and if I would ask him to clarify or rephrase he would deny my request. When I did answer he would often scoff or just pause and stare at me like it was the wrong answer. I have never felt this way in a classroom before. I do believe that there ARE stupid questions in life, which is fine, but Professor Blackman made me feel that every word that came out of my mouth was idiotic. I was not the only student who had these feelings either.
- Professor Blackman is a highly knowledgeable and engaging instructor with a strong command of constitutional doctrines and their historical foundations. His passion for the subject matter is evident, and he fosters lively class discussions that encourage students to think critically. That said, given the inherently complex and often sensitive nature of constitutional law—especially where it intersects with issues of discrimination and civil rights—it is important that course material be presented with balance. While it is natural for everyone to hold personal viewpoints, there were times when Professor Blackman's political and philosophical perspectives appeared to influence the framing of certain cases and historical narratives. A more ideologically neutral presentation, particularly when discussing contentious doctrines, would help ensure that all students feel equally represented and empowered to form their own interpretations of the law.
